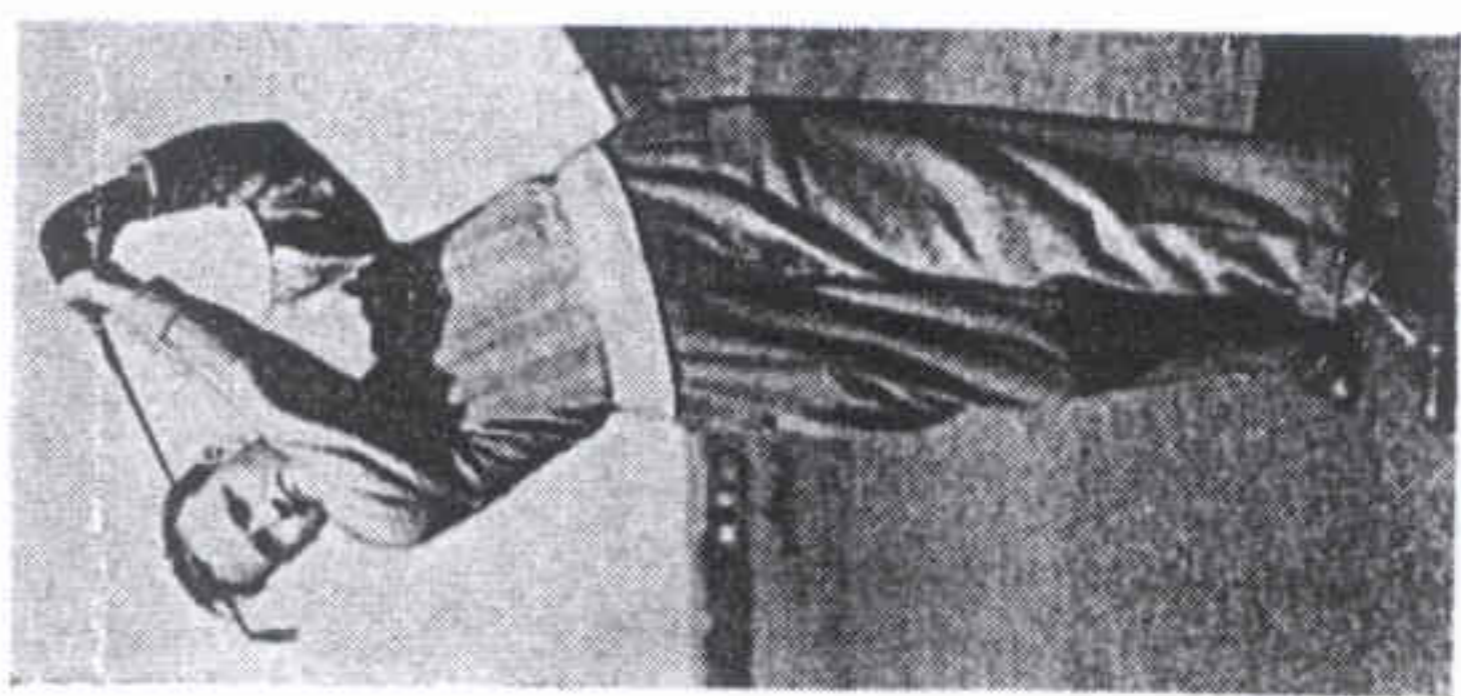

BILLY JOE PATTON (U.S.A.)

Can hold his own with the best pros in America as he showed in the recent Masters Tournament when he was only four strokes behind the winner. The only amateur to have won the gold medal in the U.S. open for three successive years (1952-54). In 1954 he was only one stroke behind Hogan and Snead in the Masters.

CHARLES R. COE. (U.S.A.)

The reigning amateur champion of his country and holder of the title in 1949. Was runner-up in the British Amateur 1951 losing to Dick Chapman at Porthcawl. Played in Walker Cup matches 1949-51-53. Finished top amateur in American Masters 1949-51. Aged 34 and from Oklahoma.

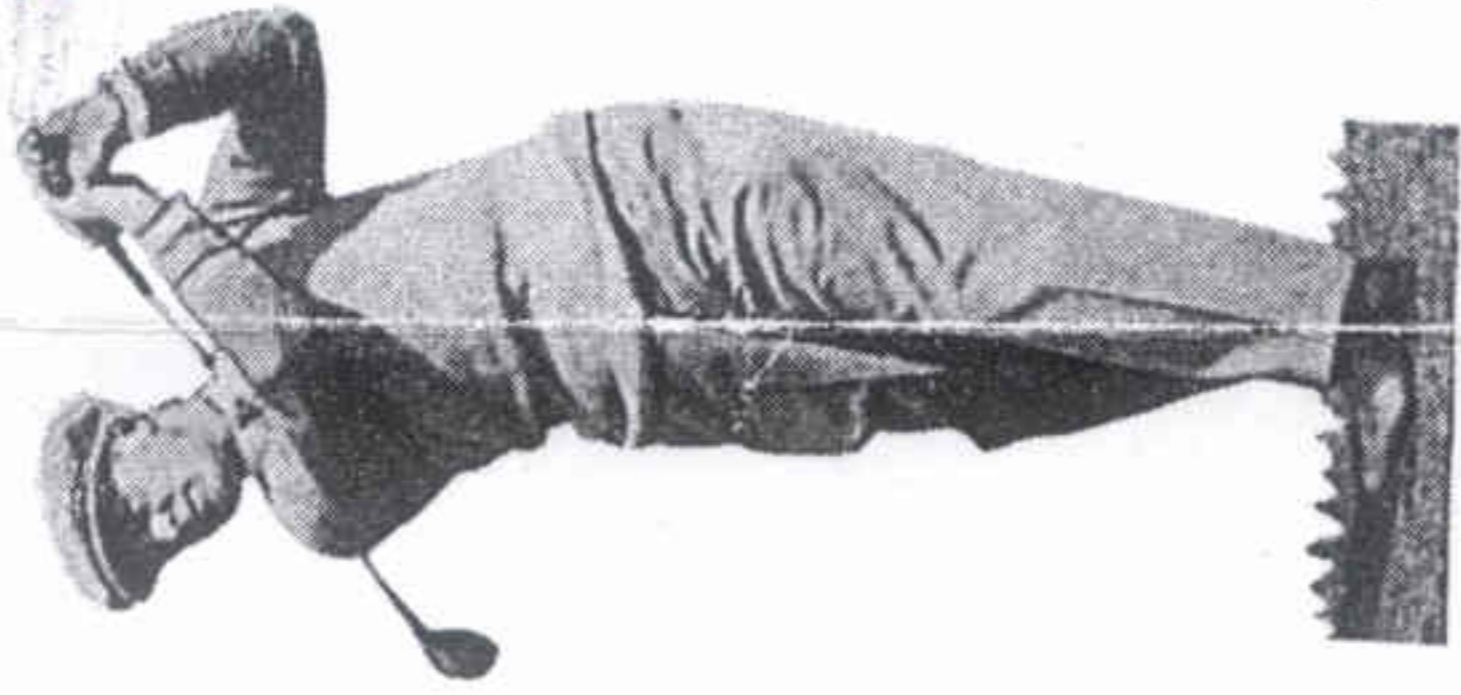
PERSONALITIES YOU'LL BE SEEING *For the first time*

NAOYASU NABESHIMA (Japan)

Slim and wiry he does not look his 51 years. Won the Japanese title three years running from 1933 and is one of three "over 40's" in the Japan side.

KIYOSHI ISHIMOTO (Japan)

The only youngster in the team. Won the amateur title of Japan only two months ago. He is 24 and the youngest ever to win this championship.

PETER TAIT (Kenya)

A Government official who was educated in Edinburgh. He played in Dalmahoj representative sides before and after the war. Tait is a member of the R. and A. and in 1950 reached the last eight of the Amateur Championship.

JOE CARR (G.B. and Ireland)

Won his second British Amateur Championship on the Old Course earlier this year. Britain's top amateur, who is in the clothing business in Dublin, has played in six Walker Cup matches and has represented Ireland in the home internationals since 1947.

LUIS SILVERIO (Philippines)

A 21-year-old well worth watching. Present amateur champion of the Philippines.

HEINRICH HARRER (Austria)

The reigning Austrian champion has a name which is famous off the golf course. Harrer is better known as a mountaineer and is the author of several books on this exhilarating and adventurous pastime.

ARTHUR PEROWNE (G.B. and Ireland)

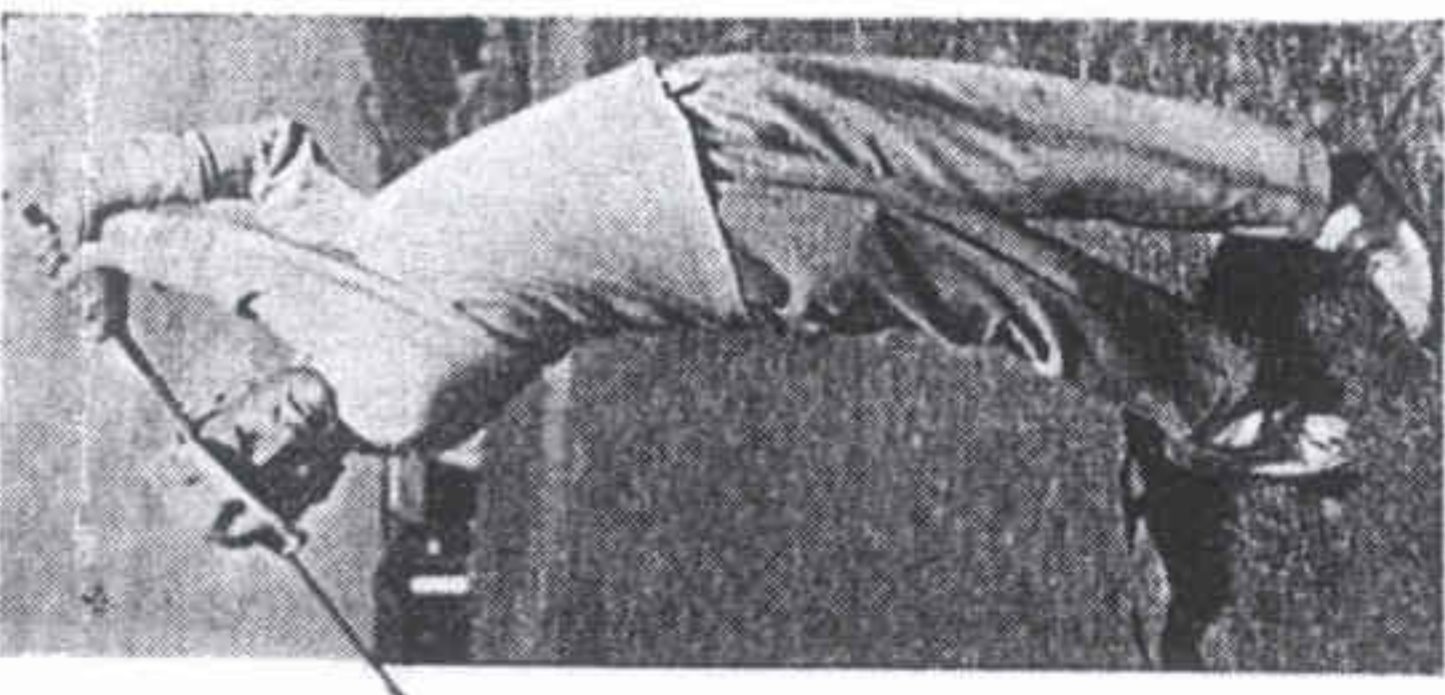
English amateur international since he was 17, and Walker Cup golfer. Perowne, who is 28 and a farmer in Norwich, recently won the English Open Amateur Stroke-Play Championship (Brabazon Trophy) with a 72-hole total of 289 in bad weather.

REID JACK (G.B. and Ireland)

Scotland's only golfer in the "home" team is always admired for his stylish play. First important success came 11 years ago in Highland Open at Pitlochry. Won the Scottish Amateur in 1955 and the British title last year when he was also chosen for the Walker Cup. Billy Joe Patton beat him by a hole in the top single.

ARTHUR WALKER (South Africa)

This is the South African international who last year spent £600 on a 12,000 mile round trip to play in British tournaments. And he became the first overseas player to win the English Championship, qualifying to play in it by parentage. He is 28 and an estate executive.
